The economy and financial markets

Companies watched for signs of a recession as global inflation continued amidst high interest rates and falling demand.



Increased geopolitical risk

Concerns around raw material shortages and production impacts take hold with increased U.S. and China tensions and the ongoing Russia-Ukraine war.



Cybersecurity takes precedence to address cyberattacks

Regionalization of sourcing

Shifts in sourcing strategies take precedence as a result of greater global export/import restrictions and geopolitical tensions.



Climate risk

A sharp increase in climate-based disruptions (from 30-70 extreme weather events in 2015-2017, to more than 250 in 2021-2023) is set to continue.
